# TOP 10 TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL SLC RESEARCH TRIP

1. Be prepared. Before you go to SLC, get film and book numbers from the Family History Library Catalog online at www.familysearch.org.

2. Make a to-do list. Establish goals and priorities prior to making your trip to SLC. Make a list of your problems and list sources that might give you answers.

3. Organize your materials; prepare electronic or paper research logs to record your findings.

4. Look at books first, since they aren't available through interlibrary loan and plan your research so that you don't have to run back and forth between floors.

5. If film has to be brought from the vault, order it on arrival (or before) and leave it for last.

6. Bring dimes for the storage lockers and plan to buy a copy card for copy machines. You can save digital images of microfilm to a flash drive, but you will still need some cash.

7. If this is your first trip, take advantage of the orientation provided and consider taking some classes.

8. Attend Sunday morning Mormon Tabernacle choir performance or Thursday night choir rehearsal for fun.

9. Ask the LDS receptionist for a pass to LDS Office Building cafeteria and information about other cafes.

10. Attend our workshop, *How to Prepare for Visiting the Family History Library*, 10:30 a.m., 1 March, at JCGL.

# FROM THE FINANCE DIRECTOR

As a member of RVGS, you undoubtedly are aware of the size and quality of our collection and websites and the friendly help offered by the librarians. Our mission is to make genealogical and historical records available to our members and the public in a variety of ways. And, thanks to our dedicated membership, we are growing, and we are able to provide you with more and better access to genea-

logical materials. RVGS is financially well situated. We have no debt, we receive no federal or state funds, and we are an all-volunteer nonprofit organization. Our financial support comes from three main sources: memberships, research fees and donations. Following are some of the opportunities for you to consider in making tax-deductible donations to RVGS:

We hold our **Annual Fund Drive** each spring to support general operating expenses. We also have designated funds which are restricted to specific purposes. Currently, the designated funds are:

**Book Fund** used to purchase books for the library collection beyond the annual budgeted amount. If a memorial donation is made to this fund, a bookplate will be placed in a book to honor that person and his/her name added to the Memorial Plaque in the Library. This fund also includes donations collected at RVGS general meetings.

**Technical Equipment Fund** is used to purchase technical equipment beyond the annual budgeted amount.

**Volunteer Recognition Fund** is used to thank volunteers at a Volunteer Recognition Luncheon in December and on other important occasions. It is the Society's way of saying *thank you* to the many volunteers who donate hundreds of hours of work.

**RVGS Endowment Fund** is a permanent fund invested with the Oregon Community Foundation and only earnings may be withdrawn by RVGS. The Board has decided that no distributions will be taken from the Endowment Fund until after May 2012. The Endowment is a **permanent fund** and your gifts to it will be held in perpetuity for the sole benefit of RVGS. Endowment support is one of the most important ways to guarantee the future of RVGS and the Jackson County Genealogy Library for generations to come. Memorial donations may be made to this fund and the honored person's name will be entered in the Endowment Record and on the Memorial Plaque in the Library. **(cont'd, page 5)**

# ORA STROM 1920- 2010

In December 2010, RVGS lost an Honorary Life Member, Ora Strom. She was a founding member of our organization in 1966 and loved to relate that she was in charge of keeping the collection of research books. The books were stored in a cardboard box under her bed until such time as the group met. She became a Charter Member in 1979 when the group formally organized and received non-profit status.

Ora was passionate about genealogy and spent her life recording her family history and volunteering for RVGS. Even before the formal organization came into existence, Ora diligently worked to inventory the Jackson County cemeteries. An interesting article in

The Mail Tribune described her as enjoying a "rather unusual way of spending her time. Armed with her notebook and pencil and probably her lunch...she hunts out old cemeteries...copying down names, dates, and other information she found on the grave markers." In the interview, she stated that "she is trying to collect and compile all of the information she can so that it will be made available to the public through the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society Library."<sup>1</sup> She did a good job! When she moved away from the valley, she left a legacy of 33,000+ cemetery cards and many compiled books of cemetery information on our county historical cemeteries. This file has now become the cemetery/death file found on our website: <u>www.rvgslibrary.org/Cemetery.html</u>; the current file contains over 50, 000 names and about 30, 000 head-stone photos. In later years, while continuing to add family information to the cemetery file, Ora also worked to expand our Pioneer Vertical File information.

We will miss her friendly smile and warm personality. Ora's example of dedication to the Society and her high standards for accuracy of information will always be a guide to our organization and volunteers.


