

E.D. FOUNDRAY, JACKSON COUNTY PIONEER

The Pioneer Files at the Rogue Valley Genealogy Library are devoted to the pioneers that settled the Jackson County area. Currently there are 800 pioneers and their families in the Pioneer Files; more added each week. Some of the files are large and contain over 100 pages of information while others may only have a couple of pages. The information in the files has been added by JCGL members or visitors who share their local family information or by the pioneer name being noticed and research being done by volunteers. The files might contain genealogy, stories, pictures, or other items relating to the pioneer, his/her family and/or

the family's place in local history. The online file index can be accessed on the JCGL website by selecting the link *Family Records* and then *Pioneer Families*. A Google search of the JCGL website for *Foundray or* any other pioneer family name would also yield access to the file index.

A lot of local history can be found by just reading the files on our pioneers. One example is the file on Elbert Downes Foundray. E.D. (as he was known) was born in Foundraysburg, Kentucky in 1821. After finishing his schooling, he left his home and set out to explore the country. He stopped first in Virginia then went on to South Carolina and Louisiana. In New Orleans E.D. signed on as a seaman on the merchant schooner the St. Mary and in 1849 headed for California and the gold fields. After a few narrow escapes with shipwrecks around Cape Horn, E.D. arrived in San Francisco. Mining didn't go as well as planned so he began a pack mule business supplying miners with muchneeded supplies. Still following the gold, he heard good reports coming from Jacksonville, Oregon. E.D. continued with his pack train business in the Southern Oregon area a few years. Then around 1853, he gave up the pack train business and became a bookkeeper in Jacksonville. Around that time he also became owner of the grist mill in Phoenix. Over the years, E.D. was elected deputy sheriff of Jacksonville, Justice of the Peace and was nominated as Democratic Representative. In 1862 E.D. married Sarah Colver. She was the daughter of a Phoenix-area pioneer, Hiram Colver. Many improvements in county affairs were traceable to the support and assistance of Mr. Foundray, and it was principally through his influence in the legislature in 1866 that a bill was introduced advocating the building of a railroad through Phoenix. E.D. died in 1903. This pioneer file is invaluable to E.D.'s family in Kentucky doing research on the

family. By searching online, any family related to someone in the 800 pioneer family files could find information about where their family member migrated to and a great deal about that person's history.

GERMAN INTEREST GROUP

The German Interest Group held its first meeting at JCGL in September 2015. We told about our ancestors in Germanic areas from the Netherlands to Ukraine, from France to northern Italy, and Germans in Russia and South America. Several came with specific research questions. Many felt a need to know more history and geography that affected immigration and our ability to locate records. Future meetings were scheduled for the second Tuesday of each month. At each meeting we share successes and problems. So far, we located resources in JCGL, viewed a brief history online at Family Search's Learning Center/German genealogy, and

made an enlarged map of the German Empire in 1870 for reference. We learned of German documents such as Reisen Paß (travel pass), intent-to-immigrate forms, and the Ahnentafel (pedigree chart) required in the Nazi era. A group member wisely pointed out that here in the U.S., land records and wills provide details to help locate towns and ancestors overseas.

Each month I send an email reminder of meeting time. This includes an updated list of surnames being researched. A list of resources and helpful hints sent to me by group members has been compiled. Subgroups such as Hesse and Emlanders have been formed and they correspond separately. Genealogy goes better (though not necessarily easier) when working with persons who share interests.

VICKI BRYDEN UPDATES SOHS INFORMATION FOR THE RVGS BOARD OF DIRECTORS





MAPS OF JACKSON COUNTY PUBLIC PROGRAM



Roger Roberts, a land surveyor and former Jackson County Surveyor, presented an overview of the Maps of Jackson County Project at Jackson County Genealogy Library on Feb. 16th 2016. After obtaining thousands of old maps, Roger, Chuck Eccleston, Barbara MacMillen, and others contributed thousands of hours to index and scan these maps. A sampling of these scanned maps was presented on that day. Even those with no local history found the presentation interesting while others recognized names on land plots from their own ancestral history of the valley. Barbara MacMillen gave an explanation of the

grant received to obtain the equipment and services needed for this huge project. The long term goal is to put all scanned maps in a file and link the index to an image to be accessed on the website by researchers.
