
ENEWS JUNE 2016





MONTHLY GENEALOGY PROGRAMS FOR THE PUBLIC



Each month RVGS sponsors FREE public programs designed to engage the interests of the public in local history and genealogy. These presentations are held at 1:30 pm on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. In May, RVGS member Vern Arnold was the guest speaker. Vern presented a program titled, "Arnold Mountain & the Arnold Mine," describing the history of that mine. The Arnold Mine was located in the upper Applegate Valley where many family members lived. Homesteads and locations discussed included Carberry Creek, Collings, and Squaw Lake. Eight people in the audience reported having had ancestors in Oregon before 1900. The earliest of these was there in 1852. The maps, stories and photos displayed provided for a very interesting hour.

The last public program until September 2016 will be held on June 21st. Daniel Perry, Innkeeper of the Historic Ashland McCall House will be the guest speaker. John McCall, original owner of the McCall House, created many businesses in our area: The Daily Tidings, Bank of Ashland, Ashland Flour Mill, Ashland Woolen Mill, Ashland Mercantile and the SOU Library. Mr. Perry will talk about John's marriage to Theresa Applegate and to Lizzie McCall. He will also relate stories on furnishing, landscaping and more, including how the home transitioned to a popular Bed and Breakfast today.

NEW YORK CITY MARRIAGE RECORDS ON THE INTERNET ARCHIVE

This collection contains images of the index to New York City marriage records for 1908 through 1929 (for varying numbers of the five boroughs depending on the year.) These records were originally kept by the New York City Clerk's Office, and were later moved to

the New York City Municipal Archives. For many decades the data was only available to the public in microfilm format, and only able to be viewed onsite at the Municipal Archives building in lower Manhattan. "Reclaim The Records" finally obtained the first-ever copies of these microfilms in

October 2015, following the settlement of a lawsuit they had brought against the Archives. Reclaim The Records digitized the films and uploaded the images to the Internet Archive in April 2016. Go to https://archive.org/details/nycmarriageindex&tab=about to access these records.

MOBILE GENEALOGY APPS



The number of mobile apps [aka programs] available for genealogists who are Android and iOS phone or tablet users is increasing rapidly. I've listed below some that can be found on Google Play for Android; there are as many or more available for iOS. Most of these apps are free.

Apps that integrate with genealogy websites. You can view your family tree, add individuals, records, etc. from your mobile device. You must have a personal account with the website to make use of these apps. Free.

- 1. For *FamilySearch* users, there is a FamilySearch app as well as a FamilySearch Memories (photos, documents, stories, and other media) app.
- 2. For *Ancestry* users, there is an Ancestry app as well as a FindaGrave app, an Ancestry Academy app (instructional webinars for genealogy), and an Ancestry Shoebox app (documents, photos, and other media).

3. For *MyHeritage* users, there is a MyHeritage app.

THIS & THAT—HISTORY

Historical facts can add context to the stories of our family history. In genealogy, we study our ancestors, but everyone lived in a particular time and place in history. To really understand our ancestors, we need to understand the context of their story—what was happening in global history at the time and what was happening in the localities where they lived.

One of the RootsTech 2016 videos that I really enjoyed was "Best Websites and Apps for Finding Local History," presented by Amy Johnson Crow, MLIS, CG. I was attracted to two of the websites that Amy demonstrated in her RootsTech presentation— HistoryPin and Clio, which both have user-submitted content. She covered other sites, too; find out about them in the video.

HistoryPin Website: https://www.historypin.org/en/



HistoryPin uses the Pinterest idea, but with a history twist. View a short video guide to HistoryPin on the homepage. Users can pin photos, scanned

documents, etc., to a geocoded map. Many of the pins have a street view and with a slider at the top of the screen that you can use to morph the view between the historic snapshot and today's view. Note the 1943 snapshot is pinned to today's location (look at the building spire).

Use "Explore History Pin" to search by location. As you zoom in the map, you'll see more and more pins. Users can group pins together in collections based on a theme. Use "Browse All Collections" to search them. Imagine the possibilities of having a collection for your family where cousins can add snapshots of the people/places in your family tree?

Clio Website: http://www.theclio.com/web/(Website and App)



This site has more descriptive text about locations and historic events than HistoryPin; and the entries often contain links to related websites. When you open the site, there is a short guide to Clio on the homepage. Entries are tagged to a location in Google Maps and may have a present day or historic photo. You can switch to street view in Google Maps, too.

Since Clio has an app, it is ideal to use while walking around a city. It's like having a historian with you telling you about what you are seeing. You can search by location, so if you are visiting a new city, take a look ahead of

time to see what is there. You can also search by name, such as Faneuil Hall or Chief Joseph. If you try Chief Joseph, you'll see his grave site in northeast Oregon.

SOME THOUGHTS ON GENEALOGY SOFTWARE AND ONLINE TREES

A few months back Ancestry.com stopped providing Family Tree Maker software. That situation was rectified when an alternate company, MacKiev, began providing software that integrated with the Ancestry website. That Ancestry no longer directly supports genealogy software still distresses me.



What bothers me about this situation is that Ancestry.com apparently views providing patrons the ability to "own" a copy of his/her tree on a personal computer or mobile device as unimportant or irrelevant. Why is this? ... Because you must have Family Tree Maker to maintain a complete copy of your Ancestry tree in your possession and under your control. As things stand now, you

cannot download your tree and keep all of the documents and photos you have attached to that tree included in the download unless you have a working copy of Family Tree Maker. (You can, of course, download a GedCom of your file but the GedCom would include only the barebones of your information, names, dates, places.) Furthermore, if you suspend your subscription to Ancestry in the future, you would no longer have access to documents and photos added to your online tree from Ancestry's database. This situation is not peculiar to Ancestry.com. A similar situation exists for MyHeritage whose software *Family Tree Builder* is required to download a complete copy of your online tree from their website. [In contrast, the not-for-profit site, FamilySearch, allows full downloads of family trees into three partner software applications: *Ancestral Quest, Legacy*, and *RootsMagic*.] To me, it is very important to own my own work and I believe it should be important to you too.

Please understand that I am not arguing against sharing information online. I'm a firm believer in sharing genealogy, and I have several public family trees. But I'm an even firmer believer in the need for each of us to maintain a personal copy of the trees that contains all supporting photos and documents. I am also concerned that working on an online family tree, say on Ancestry, without having a copy of that tree in FTM software discourages you from gathering records and information from other websites. I believe that moving away from using genealogy software toward the practice of only building trees online WILL limit your success. Why is this unimportant to Ancestry and MyHeritage? I believe it is because they build loyalty to their website (and only their website) by discouraging people from using genealogy software.

Your CD Collection is Dying

If you've tried listening to any of your old music CDs lately—if you even own them anymore—you may have noticed they often won't play. The same is probably true of data stored on CD-ROM disks; the older ones are deteriorating and are becoming more and more difficult to use. The data CD-ROM disks are producing more read errors than they used to. Luckily, there are easy solutions available if you take

steps NOW.

CD and CD-ROM data formats were never designed for long-term data storage. Instead, they were actually developed for the ease of mass production. A CD or CD-ROM disk is composed of several layers, such as a plastic polycarbonate layer, a metal reflective layer with all the data in it, and then the coating on top.

The problem is, different manufacturers have different formulations; so, it's quite complex to figure out what exactly is causing the deterioration of the disks. Even worse, the various manufacturers changed the formulation along the way, and production changes are considered to be proprietary information. In other words, the manufacturers won't tell anyone what they changed and when they changed it.

Even CDs made by the same company in the same year and wrapped in identical packaging might have totally different lifespans. It's impossible to tell just from looking at a disc how it will age.

Another issue is that mass-produced disks created in a factory use very different methods of recording the data from the methods used in the "record your own CD disks at home" variety we all use to record data onto one disk at a time. The disk you recorded at home almost certainly has a shorter life expectancy than the commercially-produced disks created in a factory.

If you have CDs or CD-ROMs that are sitting on the shelf, you need to copy them NOW. You can copy them to new CD disks or to flash drives or to most any other form of modern media. They still won't last forever, but you can get quite a few more years of life from them if you take steps now to preserve the information by copying it to new storage devices. Then, a few years from now, copy them again to even more modern media that comes into common use at that time

If you (or your surviving heirs) take the time to copy CDs, CD-ROMs, DVDs, flash drives, and more digital media to modern media and file formats every few years, your valuable information can last and be useable for centuries.
