



SO MANY GENEALOGY-RELATED YOUTUBE CHANNELS, SO LITTLE TIME!



Are you taking advantage of all the videos posted on YouTube related to genealogy and family history research? For the most part, I often just stumble across videos of interest embedded in a blog post or similar that I am reading. Once watching the video, I will see what other videos were created by the same source – basically, I check out the "channel" in which the video was found. Think of these channels kind of like tv channels except instead of NBC, ABC, CBS, etc., you have NARA, LOC, LVA, Ancestry, etc.

Since these platforms can be overwhelming, this is where finding "channels" of interest is key!

Do know that on YouTube when you visit a new channel, a video will start up immediately, so you will possibly want to pause that video and/or have your sound off as you explore.

If you take Required Minimum Distributions, you can donate all or any part of the distribution directly; send your request to the administrator of your fund. In addition, if you donate a matching amount to the Oregon Cultural Trust, you can receive a tax credit for the ENTIRE amount of your donation (maximum \$1,000 for couple; \$500 single). Just go to www.culturaltrust.org/donate for more details.

As an all-volunteer organization, all donations are put into the operation and improvement of the library or directly toward the mortgage. No funds are received from any government sources. It is because of YOU that the library has grown to be the largest genealogical library between Portland and Sacramento. CONNIE BAYLOR MILLER COLLECTION



The 19 books of the Connie Baylor Miller Collection are new additions to the large collection of family genealogies at JCGL. The collection is shelved in 929.2 under the surname Miller, but the research and information contained in the 19 books reaches far beyond that surname.

Connie was a beloved active member of RVGS, taken from us prematurely. The generous donation of her research to RVGS by her husband adds enormously to our resources for researchers interested in a fair number of surnames, especially Baylor (Connie's birth name) and Miller (Connie's married name.)

Connie was born in Talent, Jackson County, Oregon, which adds another dimension to her research, as does her close family relationship to another local genealogist, Lida Childers. Accessing PedigreeMap from the MyHeritage family site

After the coordinates are calculated, your family history events are plotted on the map.
- * The main screen of PedigreeMap shows the embedded map. On the left-hand side, there is a list of all places that appear in your family tree. The numbers on the list correspond to the number of references to each place in your family tree. The map shows pins for each location.

LOOKING FOR A NEW COMPUTER/TABLET?

Acer's Switch One 10 is a **Windows 10 laptop** that will go on sale next month. It will have a manufacturer's suggested retail price of \$249, but most discount retailers are expected to sell it for \$199, plus or minus a bit. That's a great price for a Windows 10 computer that will run any modern Windows genealogy program, including Family Tree Builder, Family Historian, RootsMagic, Legacy Family Tree, Ancestral Quest, Heredis, and others. This small computer will not replace your desktop computer but should be very handy for genealogy trips.
