Our OPENING CEREMONY EVENT, Sept. 19th, included RVGS History 1966-2016; Guest speaker Larry Horton with some highlights from his and his wife Ann's ancestry dating back to 1619 & 1620, and many "**thank yous**" to "Our 50th Year Heritage" Celebration committee. The building-remodel-of-3405 volunteer crew, and the many donors who contributed to the



retirement of the 3405 mortgage were specifically acknowledged. President Andrea Patterson also read Proclamations honoring this 50th Anniversary of the Society from the Jackson County Commissioners and the Oregon Governor. Our Anniversary Quilt was presented. (See the separate article.) Of special interest was the symbolic "shredding" of the just-retired mortgage for our current library building.

During this week of celebration there were 10 free genealogy classes, a Q & A panel, a Wine and Cheese Reception honoring our volunteers (complete with a photo of each volunteer), and an Ice Cream Social for members and donors. The library was open its usual 41 weekly hours M, Tu, W, Th, F, & Sat 10-4 PM and Tuesdays until 9 PM. Many new attendees found this library treasure and our many services.

The celebration culminated in a banquet Sept. 26 at the Inn at the Commons with guest speaker, Judy Russell, "The Legal Genealogist" giving an entertaining lecture on "The Lighter Side of the Law," with humorous examples of our history of laws on the books! She conducted a daylong seminar Sept. 27th with four classes providing researchers with information on DNA, women and the law, court records that tell a story, and widows and orphans. After visiting our library she told the audience how impressed she was with our library, and how she was overwhelmed by the beautiful Anniversary Quilt. It immediately went on her blog and Facebook page (along with photos of Crater Lake later in the week.)

We had over 16 door prizes and a very successful raffle, which raised over \$1,400 towards our celebration expenses. (See list of winners.)


