President's End-of-Year Message 2018

For Rogue Valley Genealogical Society and Jackson County Genealogy Library, 2018 has been another year of consolidating our strengths, planning for the future and continuing to grow! We added a Smart TV to our Reading Room and have used it for our Tutorial Tuesdays program series, a Genealogy Week class and a number of other meetings, while our acoustic quality accordion doors allowed us to hold events simultaneously! Genealogy Week was exceptionally successful this year, with ground-breaking attendance of 360 nearly doubling 2017's attendance. Membership continues to grow, from 714 a year ago to 838, with the annual increase almost double the previous year's increase.

Rick and Pam Sayre shared lots of new research ideas to help answer questions about "Our Ancestors: Did They Serve? Did They Plow? Did They Move?" at our annual April Seminar and wowed us with the "The Power of Google Earth."

Our excellent monthly public programs and "Quilts and Genealogy Talks" are drawing larger audiences (also thanks to Pam Sasseen, our Publicity Director), and we offered at least one class most months. Our programs are now being video recorded by Maureen Battistella as part of "Stories of Southern Oregon" and are viewable on [Youtube.com](https://www.youtube.com). We began a year-long Beginning DNA class series and we continue to offer an OLLI (Osher Lifelong Learning Institute) Beginning Genealogy course each fall.

Two of our members have volunteered to sell surplus genealogy books for us on Amazon (after our members have first chance at them at JCGL.) As of November 1 they have netted over \$3,000.

We participated in the Oregon Quilt Documentation Project, which allows us to enter the quilts we own and quilts we document in the [National Quilt Index](#).

We lost a strong supporter this year with the death of Larry Horton. We also lost other members and past members: Dorothy Throne, Jerry Johnson, Robert Beckett and Janis Seaton. We miss them.

What does all of this mean? We are a strong, fiscally responsible, thriving, all-volunteer organization. 102 active volunteers have given us a total of over 12,000 volunteer hours from January through October 31. We are flourishing and will continue to flourish as we update our five year strategic plan and find ways to keep pace with future developments. We are especially looking forward to the launch of our new website in 2019. Congratulations: this is YOUR organization, and you are keeping it healthy...through your suggestions, your contributions, and your volunteering.

Financial News: Need a Tax Deduction for 2018?

Memories from Colleen and Chuck Eccleston:

Colleen remembers that before Andrea became RVGS Secretary, she was Publicity. "Chuck and I were the co-Publicity Chairs, and we turned the job over to her, happily. I don't remember how long she had this position, but she did move to the Secretary spot from publicity. She took these positions seriously, and set high standards for those who followed. I see in our book, RVGS History 1966 – 2006, that she was Secretary beginning in 2005. She was instrumental in forming a computer committee to broaden our usage of computers and internet training.

Chuck recalls in early 2000, before leaving her position with State Children's Services, Andrea was instrumental in getting several used computer desks donated to the Society Library. She also facilitated the first computer desk being custom-made for the reception area at Phoenix.

Andrea began the popular program of annual seminars given by nationally known speakers. She also worked with Connie Miller's husband to establish the "Connie Miller Memorial Fund" which provides scholarships and financial assistance to members unable to afford costly seminars. It is also

important to note that she had husband, Jack, remodel the upstairs in the Phoenix building by removing a bathroom and shower facility to create another work station and a better storage area.

Chuck recalls inviting Andi to lunch five years ago to discuss the new slate of Officers, which was filled except for the President's position. At the end of his report she asked Chuck who was being nominated for the President position. After a long pause Chuck told her Karen Asche had agreed to take the VP spot provided Andi would agree to take the new President slot. She said "no way" and went home to tell Jack what Chuck had tried to con her into. Jack was taking another 3 year term as President of the Fly Fisherman's Club and suggested she take the RVGS Board President job while he was occupied with his new job. Chuck suspects Jack also promised to help at the new library, which he certainly has done and continues to do.

Andrea did NOT expect to be President for 3 years, but she was, and she was a terrific President. She plowed through all of the RVGS policies so that they are up-to-date. She and Chloe Sternola are organizing RVGS's records both digital and paper, which is an enormous job.

Andi has also spear-headed our hugely successful annual Seminars, which have energized our genealogy research and enlarged our membership and our breadth of knowledge. She has already booked our 2020 Seminar speaker, John Philip Colletta!

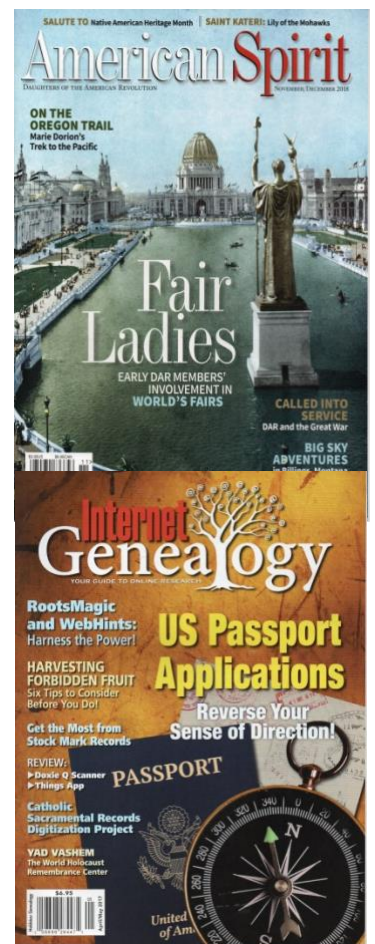

NEW ADDITIONS TO OUR LIBRARY

Thanks to our two hard-working catalogers, Sharon Freeburne and Diane Brenner, we added more than 100 books to the JCGL collection in November...too many to list in the eNews.

[Click here to view the complete list of new books added in December](#), which includes lots of Family Histories (929.2), books about Scotland (941.1), New York state (974.7) and Tuscarawas County, Ohio (977.166). Several other states and subjects are also included.

Of special note is the addition of the first ever *Birth Certificates for Jackson County, Oregon*, for the years 1916 and 1917 (979.527 B378 Bir). Birth certificates are not released for 100 years in Oregon, and these are the first years to be made available. Special thanks to our longtime volunteer in Salem, Elizabeth Kelly, who scanned these and the ongoing series of *Death Certificates for Jackson County, Oregon* (released after 50 years.) We currently have 1903-1966 in our collection (979.527 D218 Dea). They are a boon to researchers with Jackson County ancestors.
