# **Ester Olsen Smith MacFayden's Eight Point Star Blocks**

#### The 2019 RVGS Raffle Quilt

The 2019 RVGS Raffle Quilt is a gorgeous lavender and cream eight point star quilt started in the 1930s and finished by RVGS Quilt Committee member, Lynn Ransford. Tickets are available at the RVGS front desk, \$1 each, 6 for \$5 and 30 for \$20, with the drawing planned for June 25, 2019.

In January 2016, Ester Olsen Smith MacFayden's great-grandson donated a bin box filled with quilt tops to the Jackson County Genealogy Library. The tops were everyday examples of needlework from the 1930s and 1940s. The library's Quilt Committee members hypothesize that Ester may have ordered the quilt patterns from the newspaper, complete with all the fabric needed! That kind of newspaper offering was widely available in the 1930s.

The Society conducted a silent auction in 2016 and Lynn Ransford, Quilt Committee member, won the lavender and white Eight Point



Star blocks and finished the quilt. Lynn donated the completed quilt back to the Society for the 2019 quilt raffle. Thank you, Lynn!

## JACKSON COUNTY GENEALOGY LIBRARY NEWS

#### **Librarians Needed**

JCGL is open 41 hours each week. What does this mean? The Library is used; the hours are convenient and easy to remember: 10 to 4 six days a week, Monday through Saturday, PLUS Tuesday nights until 9 p.m.

How do we do this? Only thanks to the efforts, energy, and willingness of librarian volunteers. Right now we have a shortage of librarians, with some specific shifts in need of a regular commitment. We ask for 2 shifts per month, if at all possible. Responsibilities include the Reception Desk (greeting library users, writing receipts for membership dues, fees, and donations) AND helping people use the library effectively: the library collection and its online catalog, the six subscription websites (American Ancestors, Ancestry, FindMyPast, Fold3, HistoryGeo, and MyHeritage), genealogy websites, how to research their genealogy, etc.

Some of the available shifts are: Monday afternoons, 1-4 1st Tuesday evenings, 4-9 pm 1st Wednesdays, 10-4 1st Thursdays, 10-4 3rd Saturday, 10-4 4th Saturday, 10-1

full day shifts can be split into 2 shifts: 10-1 and 1-4

Why do this? You learn new genealogy research resources; you meet fun people; you have a regular time when you MIGHT get to work on your own genealogy!


