

Annual Fund Drive Launched

This month is the launch of the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society Annual Fund Drive. Members should have received a letter in the mail by now. If not, read on!

Thank you for making 2018 another successful year! Thanks to generous donations to the Annual Fund Drive, we surpassed the goal set by the board! The library has grown to more than 19,000



cataloged items; 1,090 people have attended 104 classes; and 19 free programs inform an increasing number of new attendees. We also have five interest groups which meet monthly. Some of our programs can now be watched on YouTube. We also offer Genealogy Week and Tutorial Tuesdays.

Why donate?

VISIT AN OLD FLAME

At the new Statue of Liberty Museum you can stand next to the original torch from the statue France sent to the USA in 1886. Exhibits there document the story behind the 150-foot Lady Liberty and display artifacts such as the torch. You'll be able to read on the original bronze plaque the poem that names the statue "Mother of Exiles."

The New Colossus by Emma Lazarus



Not like the brazen giant of Greek fame,
With conquering limbs astride from land to land;
Here at our sea-washed, sunset gates shall stand
A mighty woman with a torch, whose flame
Is the imprisoned lightning, and her name
Mother of Exiles. From her beacon-hand
Glows world-wide welcome; her mild eyes command
The air-bridged harbor that twin cities frame.
"Keep, ancient lands, your storied pomp!" cries she
With silent lips. "Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door.

You will hear recordings of immigrants remembering the moment they first saw the statue.

The museum, opened May 16, 2019, faces the back of the Statue of Liberty. With a few replaced parts the statue remains a universal symbol of freedom that many cherish.



Ester Olsen Smith MacFayden's Eight Point
Star Blocks

In January 2016, Ester Olsen Smith MacFayden's great-grandson donated a bin box filled with quilt

tops to the Jackson County Genealogy Library. The tops were everyday examples of needlework from the 1930s and 1940s. The library's Quilt Committee members hypothesize that Ester may have ordered the quilt patterns from the newspaper, complete with all the fabric needed! That kind of newspaper offering was widely available in the 1930s. Later in 2016 the Society conducted a silent auction to share the tops with Jackson County quilters. Ester's quilt tops (including some single blocks) were displayed in the library. Lynn Ransford, Quilt Committee member, bid on and won the lavender and white Eight Point Star blocks. The Silent Auction Bidding Slip listed:





Lynn remembers her thought process while completing the quilt top: "The additional cutout star that was listed was not completed. There were other pieces to make more stars that Ester had cut out, but it appeared she ran short of the off-white muslin background material. I did not attempt to find a match for that missing fabric. (At a later date I did find off-white muslin that is a close match to what Ester used and I made a bed pillow sham with the rest of her cut-out, but not stitched together pieces.) I used the completed twenty 12-inch blocks (not the sixteen listed on the Bidding Slip), and her yardage, to put together her quilt top. Ester must have intended the top to be larger, but I used only her completed blocks. They were all hand pieced and so I, consistent with Ester's work, pieced the finished blocks together by hand. The only machine quilting is in the joining of the fabric on the quilt back and attaching her border fabrics. Ester's quilt is all hand-quilted."

Sue Waldron put together genealogy research on Ester:

Ester was born 20 Feb 1882 in Camanche, Iowa and grew up on the banks of the Mississippi River. On 20 March 1901, Ester married Louis E. Smith in Clinton, Iowa, which is just north of Camanche. The marriage record shows Ester as 19 years old and her father as Christ Olsen and her mother as Malissa Gordon.

Louis (Ester's husband) also grew up on the banks of the Mississippi River. He was born in Ohio 31 August 1882. His father, William Smith is shown as a potter in the Jackson, Wisconsin Federal Census of 1880. Just four doors away lived Esther Sanborn and her daughter, Isabella. William Smith and Isabella Sanborn (Louis' parents) married in 1881 and then traveled to Sweetland, Muscatine County, Iowa which is on the Mississippi River. Sweetland is about sixty miles southwest of Camanche, where Ester was living. There were five pottery manufacturers in town, a school and two stores. Five years after Louis and Ester 1901 marriage they became the parents of Ruth Ann, born 17 February 1906.

In the 1910 Federal Census for Illinois, Louis is reported to be employed as a "River Shell Digger." He and his family dug mussels from the bottom and banks of the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers. Once cleaned, the mussel shells were sold to one of the numerous button factories throughout the area.

By 1920 Ester and family were in Davenport, Iowa and Louis was listed in the census records as a "bridge carpenter." Sometime between 1920 and 1930 Louis and Ester divorced. Perhaps this was when family tradition says that Ester became a cook on a riverboat. By the 1930 Federal Census Ester was married to Robert MacFayden.

Robert Wilmet MacFadyen was born in Edford Township, Henry County, Illinois (which is southeast of Davenport, Iowa) on 25 February 1882, just 5 days after Ester. His parents, Robert and Mary Glass MacFadyen, came from Scotland to Illinois where Robert Sr. went to work as a coal miner.

Robert was shown in census records as being a blacksmith. After Robert and Ester married they settled in Colona, Illinois, probably in the house Robert shared with his

widowed mother. It is my guess (Sue's guess) that this is when Ester took up quilting. (That would have been about 1930, which would be consistent with the ages of the fabrics in Ester's guilt blocks.)

Both Louis and Robert were veterans of the Spanish American War. Louis served in Cuba and Robert in the Philippine Islands. Louis Smith (Ester's first husband) died in 1950 in Harristown, Illinois. Robert MacFadyen (Ester's second husband) died in 1957. Ester died in 1960. Both Ester and Robert are buried in Colona, Illinois.

Ruth Ann Smith (Ester's daughter) married John T. Risse and they had five children. Their oldest daughter, Marjorie (Ester's granddaughter) married Orland King and moved to Medford, Oregon in 1975. Marjorie brought Ester's quilt tops with her to Oregon. Marjorie died in Medford in 2015.





It was Marjorie and Orland's son who donated his great-grandmother Ester's quilt tops to the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society. The quilt top and backing are constructed from fabrics Ester purchased in the 1930s!


