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
## CLASSES & EVENTS at Jackson County Genealogy Library

## Historic Happenings in our Area in August

Aug 6<sup>th</sup>: 7:00pm - First Tuesday Pub Talk at Four Daughters Irish Pub: "Sarah Ann: A Jackson County Mystery" Anne Billeter, Past President of the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society, shares her storytelling talents and research skills at the August 6th First Tuesdays Pub Talk, "Sarah Ann: A Jackson County Mystery." There are no names on a gravestone in the Jacksonville Cemetery, just the single word, "Mother." Who was she? Could she have been Sarah Ann? If so, what was her story? Why did she keep disappearing, or did she? Join Anne at the Four Daughters Irish Pub in Medford; Anne will take you on the research trail for the story of Sarah Ann, a Jackson County 1850's pioneer.



"Windows in Time" Aug 7<sup>th</sup>: 12:00 Noon (Medford Library) and Aug 14<sup>th</sup>: 12:00 Noon (Ashland Library) - "The Chinook Salmon Migration to the Upper Klamath River" with John Hamilton. Free to all.

#### Jacksonville Tours

The following tours run through Labor Day weekend. For additional information or interviews with tour guides, please contact 541-245-3650, <u>info@historicjacksonville.org</u>, or visit <u>www.historicjacksonville.org</u>.

**Friday through Monday**, **"Behind the Counter"** tours of the Beekman Bank, *the oldest bank in the Pacific Northwest*, that saw over \$40 million in gold cross its counters in the late 1800s (equivalent to over \$1 billion today). Located at 110 West California Street in Jacksonville, "banking hours" are 11a.m. to 4p.m. Visitors can step behind the counters, look in drawers, enter the vault, open the safe, and learn about "handshake banking" in the late 1800s. **Tours are free**, and guests can spend as little or as much time as they like!

**Saturday mornings, 10:00 a.m.**, take a 1-hour walking tour of Jacksonville's Historic Landmark District with a Walk Through History guide. **"Walk through History"** visits government and commercial buildings, fraternal lodges, and homes that capture the stories of

Jacksonville's National Historic Landmark District and the people who transformed a gold rush town into Southern Oregon's 19th Century social, governmental, and commercial hub. The tour leaves from Jacksonville's "Courthouse Square" ("New City Hall") on North 5<sup>th</sup> Street between West C and D streets. **Tours are free.** 

**Saturday mornings** you can explore **"19th Century Family Life"** at the 1873 Beekman House, home to Jacksonville's wealthiest and most prominent pioneer family. Tours highlight upper class 19th Century lifestyle, changes brought about by the Industrial Revolution, and Victorian architectural and design innovations, providing insights into upper class Jacksonville lifestyle during the late 1800s. These half hour tours begin every 20 minutes between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. with costumed docents adapting the tours to guests' areas of interest. The Beekman House is located at 470 E. California Street in Jacksonville. The \$3 admission goes to the on-going maintenance of this historic landmark.

**Aug 10<sup>th</sup> – 10 a.m.** - **History Saturday in the Cemetery** Join the Friends of Jacksonville's Historic Cemetery for a talk and walking tour in Jacksonville's Historic Cemetery. Our August topic will focus on "Courageous Women, Ahead of Their Time."



**Aug 13th – 6:30p.m.** - **Tuesday Evening Cemetery Stroll** at the Jacksonville cemetery Take an after-dinner stroll with the Friends of Jacksonville and learn some of the history of this Pioneer Cemetery. The August Stroll will be in the Masonic Section of the Cemetery.

#### Both History Saturday and the Tuesday Evening Strolls are free with no advance

**reservations required.** Meet your docents at the top of the Cemetery Road where parking is available. We suggest wearing comfortable walking shoes, a hat and sunscreen. #### Newspapers.com: No thanks, not at that price! - by Anne Billeter

Consensus of the 5 members who responded to the request for input, plus the RVGS Board, was NOT to purchase a one-year subscription at the offered (slightly reduced) annual price of \$3,218.40. It became clear from the input that further explanations would be appreciated:

 Pricing is completely different for individuals versus libraries. Libraries may not purchase a personal subscription and make it available to library users. That is a violation of the terms of the subscription.



- Pricing for libraries appears to be "one-size-fits-all," although, since subscription prices are not posted openly, that is somewhat difficult to ascertain.
- Several members indicated that they had found Newspapers.com difficult to use. As with almost every website, there are tips and tricks that can improve the success of your search, but if Newspapers.com does not have newspapers for the place and time you are researching, you will not have success. (If the name you are searching is common or has *other meanings* in addition to its use as a surname (such as street, baker, miller), you may not have success, unless you can narrow your search by date and place.)
- Several members did not appear to recognize the potential value of successful newspaper searches. We invite them to come to the free class during Genealogy Week, (September 21-27) about Internet Newspaper Research (Sep. 25, 1:00-2:30.) Sometimes a newspaper is the ONLY source for a vital record, and sometimes newspapers can reveal an aspect of an ancestor that was completely unexpected. (My Dad won a speech contest in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade!), so, newspapers do NOT only report bad news!


