Tuesday, September 3, 2019 - 7pm at Four Daughters Irish Pub, 126 W Main Street, Medford **Journeying to Crater Lake, 1889: The Adventures of the Jacksonville Seven,** by Alice Mullaly. In 1889 a group of 20-something men and women from Jacksonville's prominent families had a three-week adventure traveling to Crater Lake and back. One of them, Fletcher Linn, kept a diary of the trip. Hear his humorous entries and see 19th century photos of the places they visited. Alice Mullaly is a longtime volunteer at SOHS with a particular interest in sharing local history stories.

Start BUYING your tickets for the Annual "Meet the Pioneers" tours in Jacksonville's Pioneer Cemetery, on Friday, October 4 and Saturday, October 5. Players in period costumes stand grave side and share their stories and those of historic events during the 1800-1900's. Guided tours depart at 4:00 p.m. then every 15 minutes until the last tour at 6:30 p.m. Tickets go on sale September 4, and may be reserved at: friendsjvillecemetery.org or by calling 541 826-9939, or at the ticket booth next to the Jacksonville Post Office during the hours of 10:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. on September 4-7 and on Fridays and Saturdays through the month of September. This is a fund raiser for the Friends of Jacksonville's Historic Cemetery and helps support restoration and preservation efforts. Tours sell out – get your tickets early!

Friday, September 6

Jacksonville Haunted History walking tours. These 1-hour guided walks introduce guests to ghosts and spirits from Jacksonville's pioneer past still lingering in the town's historic buildings. Two different tour routes are available. Courthouse route tours highlighting brothels, epidemics, and hangings are offered at 7pm and again at 7:30pm. Britt Hill route tours featuring arson, saloons, and Chinatown begin at 7:15pm and repeat at 7:45pm. Both tours include multiple haunted houses. All tours leave from the Jacksonville Visitors' Center at the corner of N. Oregon and "C" streets. The cost is \$5 per person and all proceeds go to the preservation of Jacksonville's historic buildings. Brainstorming our future!

You are invited to join with other RVGS members on **Tuesday, October 15, from 1:30 – 3:00 p.m**. to brainstorm the future of RVGS and JCGL. What do YOU want? Think about our facility, our collections, our services. What do we do, and what do we have, that you want to continue? What should we add (or subtract!)? How can YOU best benefit from your membership in RVGS and use of the JCGL?

RVGS is now 53 years old, as is our library (JCGL), which started with a box of books under the librarian's bed.

What will RVGS and JCGL look like in our future? We started with the box of books. Now we own a 5,400 square foot building with plenty of parking, are open 41 hours a week, AND have:

- A library of 20,000 cataloged items, mostly books, but also maps, CDs, DVDs, videos, microfilm, microfiche, magazines, and flash drives, with an online library catalog
- 16 patron computers with access to 6 subscription websites
- Family Affiliate Library status with the Family History Library (FHL), providing access to many digital records at the FHL
- A meeting room with an 89 person capacity, which can be divided into 2 meeting rooms
- An HDMI ceiling mounted projector and coordinated giant screen
- A Smart TV
- Wireless access to the Internet
- Over 800 members
- Over 100 volunteers
- Two websites, providing access to Society information and to indexes to Jackson and Josephine County records and documents
- Mentoring
- Research services
- Photo restoration and scanning services
- Classes, an annual seminar, programs, interest groups, and Genealogy Week



BOOK REVIEW by Diane Brenner: A Newly Published Book of Note

David McCullough. *The Pioneers: The Heroic Story of the Settlers Who Brought the American Ideal West.* Simon and Schuster, 2019. 263p + notes

If you, like me, have Revolutionary War ancestors who picked up and moved to Ohio around 1800, here's an easy way to grab a sense of the time. McCullough focuses on the Northwest Territory (you know, Ohio to Illinois, THAT Northwest), the Ohio Company of Associates, and the founding of Marietta. Development of travel, boat building, Indian troubles, and government are detailed through an examination of a remarkable group of settlers who left diaries detailing life on the Ohio frontier. If you know nothing of Ohio, here's a place to start.

It is not a book in the Genealogy Library, but is available at Costco for under \$20. The Jackson County Library system has 11 hard copies and 9 in audio format.
